The National Navy UDT-SEAL Museum is the only museum dedicated solely to preserving the history and heritage of the Navy SEALs and their predecessors. Located in Fort Pierce, Florida, the birthplace of the Navy Frogman—and coming soon to San Diego, California—the Museum promotes public education by providing the opportunity to explore the history of Naval Special Warfare.

We honor our fallen on the black granite walls of the Navy SEAL Memorial, while caring for our families through the

Trident House Charities Program. This includes the Trident House, the Scholarship Program, the K9 Project, Family Support initiatives, and Capital Projects that support our Mission.

Built to honor the men who served with fortitude and dedication, the Navy SEAL Museum first opened its doors on Veterans Day in 1985. From humble beginnings, the Museum has experienced tremendous growth, achieving national designation in 2007.

The Trident House Charities Program

The Trident House Charities Program is the very heartbeat of the National Navy SEAL Museum. The Museum's outreach program is comprised of four areas of assistance.

The Trident House - Two residences that provide temporary refuge for the families of the Special Operations community. Both serene waterfront escapes along the Indian River in Florida, the Trident Houses offer peaceful respite for those who have served, as well as a place of healing for Gold Star families who have lost loved ones in training or combat. Operated entirely on donations, the houses are completely complimentary for guests who come to stay.

Family Support - Providing support is no small feat when it involves additional or unexpected necessities. Active duty and veterans and their families are faced with varying needs—from medical and dental costs to academic and domestic expenditures. The Museum's Family Support

program ensures funding to families who require it most, filling in the gaps where Federal funding is not available.

The Scholarship Program - Scholarships are awarded to children of the Special Operations community for Pre-K and private school grades K-12, as well as for college, trade, and technical school. Consideration is given to grade point average, test scores, class ranking, extracurricular activity involvement, leadership positions held, volunteer and community involvement, and financial need.

The K-9 Project - Due to the generosity of caring benefactors, the Navy SEAL Museum donates service dogs to veterans of the Special Operations community. This unique program helps operators assimilate back into civilian life by placing a highly-trained service dog with the handler. The bond that develops between elite operators and elite canines provides a special companionship that helps heal many invisible wounds of war.

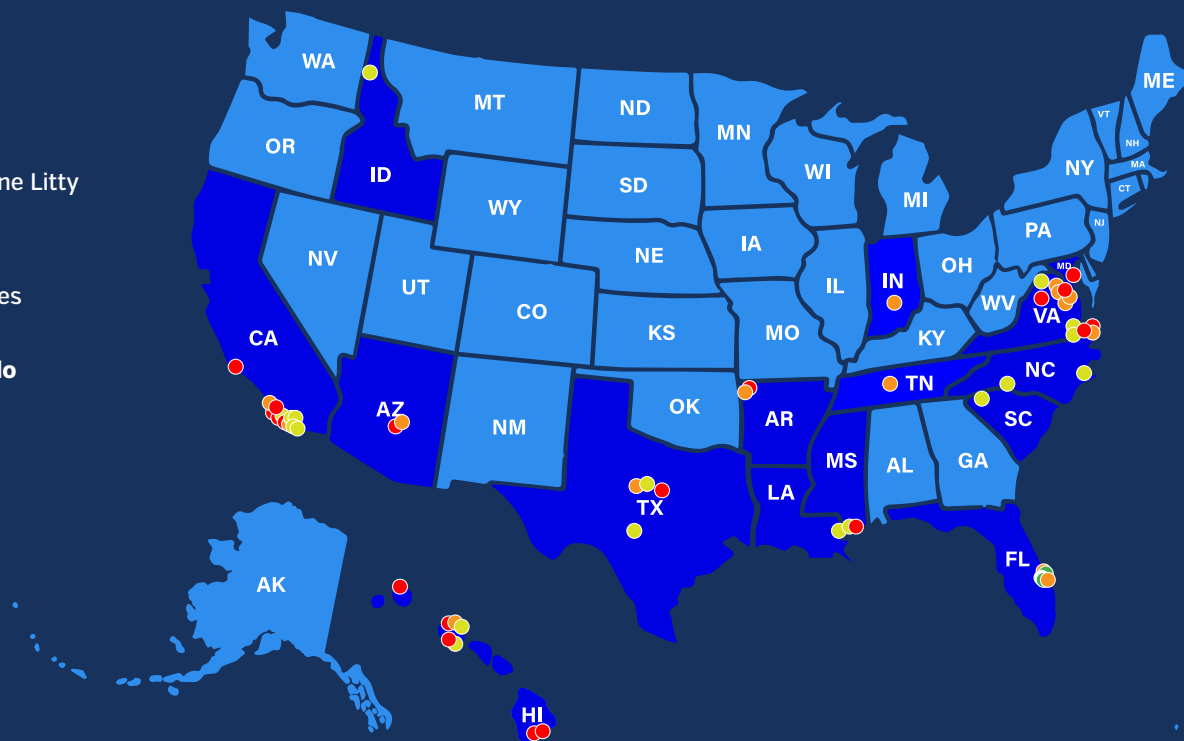
